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those observations are found in in your reference list. For example, say you are referencing an observation found in a book. The basic APA reference list format for a book is: Author Lastname, First Initial(s). (Year). Title of book: Subtitle if applicable. Publication Location: Publisher.

Although published articles differ in format from manuscripts submitted for publication or student papers (e.g., different line spacing, font, margins, and column format), articles published in APA journals provide excellent demonstrations of APA Style in action. The transition to seventh edition style will occur over time and on a journal-by-journal basis until all APA journals use the new style.

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When observing, it is especially important to separate observations from your feelings or reactions to observations. A good way to do this is to take your observations in a double-entry notebook. A double-entry notebook has two columns, one for what is directly observed and one is for what the observer interprets from the events.

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The American Psychological Association recommends using Times New Roman size 12 font. While the formatting requirements for your paper might vary depending upon your instructor's directions, your essay will most likely need to include a title page, abstract, introduction, body, conclusion, and reference sections.
